Opinion

Basis of Reporting

This Statement has been prepared by Quest: A Society for Adult Support & Rehabilitation, a public sector entity, as they are required to report compensation information pursuant to the Public Sector Compensation Disclosure Act of the Province of Nova Scotia.

The management of Quest: A Society for Adult Support & Rehabilitation is responsible for the preparation of this Statement in accordance with the Public Sector Compensation Disclosure Act.

Section 4 of the Public Sector Compensation Disclosure Act requires that the information reported in this Statement be disclosed in the body of the audited financial statements of Quest: A Society for Adult Support & Rehabilitation or in a statement prepared for the purposes of the Act certified by its auditors.

Compensation

Section 2(b) of the Public Sector Compensation Disclosure Act defines compensation as the total amount or value of all cash and non-cash salary, wages, payments, allowances, bonuses, commissions and perquisites, other than a pension, pursuant to any arrangement, including an employment contract, and includes, without restricting the generality of the foregoing:

- (i) all overtime payments, retirement or severance payments, lump-sum payments and vacation payouts,
- (ii) the value of loan or loan-interest obligations that have been extinguished and of imputed-interest benefits from loans,
- (iii) long-term incentive plan earnings and payouts,
- (iv) the value of the benefit derived from vehicles or allowances with respect to vehicles,
- (v) the value of the benefit derived from living accommodation provided or any subsidy with respect to living accommodation,
- (vi) payments made for exceptional benefits not provided to the majority of employees,
- (vii) payments for memberships in recreational clubs or organizations, and
- (viii) the value of any other payment or benefit prescribed in the regulations.
